Rector Writes:

September 2014

This month Fiona Robinson begins her theological studies and spiritual formation to become a priest. Fiona amongst other things is Warden at St Mary's Church and over the next year she will use her time with us to develop her 'priestly' character. She will then move to another parish for a year to gain a different perspective and develop her 'priestly' character in other ways. After that she will join another parish for her final year. After three years of study and formation Fiona will be ordained a 'deacon' by the Lord Bishop of Chester in his Cathedral, after one year of being a 'deacon' Fiona will then be ordained a priest. The Church of England maintains a threefold order of ordained ministry: deacon, priest and bishop. This is part of our shared heritage with western Catholicism and marks the Church of England from Protestant denominations which ceased to hold this threefold order at the reformation or subsequently to it. Those ordained will take up various positions in the Church, they may be curates, vicars, rectors, canons, chaplains but they will always be deacons and priests.

Fiona will need our prayers, our support and our encouragement both as individuals and corporately as a parish. There is no doubt that over these three years Fiona will change, grow and develop. She will experience different patterns of worship, deepen her knowledge and appreciation of Church teaching and be exposed to various pastoral contexts. Fiona will be in her mid-fifties when she is ordained and will continue in her secular employment, in this way Fiona may be serving the Church over the next twenty to twenty five years as an assistant priest in a parish. The changes and challenges that are ahead of both Fiona and the Church as both seek to communicate the love of God for the world are daunting. But tremendous strength can be gained from those that have gone before. The Church's history throws up many challenging times and periods which were met with courage, determination and faith by men and women who put their trust in God. There have been priests serving the parish of Alderley for almost a thousand years (which Birtles was a part until 1890). Prestbury was our mother Church and priests would make the journey from there to here. It is remarkable to think that there were no clocks and at that period no bells or even a Church. Yet these priests week on week gathered a community around them to hear God's word and celebrate the sacraments. From this beginning a Church was built and at the start of the thirteenth century the parish of Alderley with its own Rector was established. We stand on the shoulders of previous generations of lay and ordained faithful who have launched out into the unknown believing that their faith will be met with God's good grace. We are testament to that faith and should be confident of joining our faith with theirs so that the life of the Church can be passed to generations yet to be born. God can make all things possible and prosper our work done in his name.

Alderley War Memorial

In February 1919, a public meeting was held to decide on what to do to preserve the memory of those who had served in the Great War. Lord and Lady Sheffield (Stanley) were in attendance and chaired the meeting.

It was felt that something beautiful and lasting should be placed in the Church and therefore a War Memorial Fund was set up. A committee was appointed to consider the matter and collect subscriptions

Their findings were put to another Public meeting in January 1920, were it was unanimously resolved to accept the design. The originator of the design was Mr Hubert Worthington.

The modelling would be undertaken by Hugh Miller, of Messrs. Earp, Hobbs and Miller, Sculptures of Manchester. A Faculty was applied for: 24/02/1920

At the vestry meeting in April 1921, Canon Cecil Brooke Welland, Rector of Alderley, apologised to the meeting that progress on the Memorial had been rather slow but things were now beginning to take pace.

The subscriptions which amounted to £500, with the promise of more if needed, were used to pay for the Memorial.

The Memorial was completed and dedicated by the Bishop of Chester on 5th February 1922. Long before the service was due to start the church was full, with additional seating also full. Seats had been reserved for the relatives of those whose names appeared on the memorial. It was announced during the service that in no circumstances were artificial flowers be placed on the ledge under the memorial. If they were found there they would be removed!

HYMN: The story behind ... JUST AS I AM

The hymn 'Just As I Am' must be one of the most famous in the world. It has been sung by tens of millions of Christians at Billy Graham Crusades the world over, just for starters! Yet it was not written by a professional who was 'aiming' at a specific market, as many songs seem to be written today. Instead, it was written by an artist in Victorian times.

Her name was Charlotte Elliott, and she was born in Clapham in 1789. She grew up in a well to do home, and became a portrait artist and also a writer of humorous verse. All was well until Charlotte fell ill in her early 30s, and slid into a black depression. A minister, Dr Caesar Malan of Switzerland, came to visit her. Instead of sympathising, he asked her an unexpected question: did she have peace with God? Charlotte deeply resented the question and told him to mind his own business.

But after he left, his question haunted her. Did she have peace with God? She knew that she did not, that she had done some very wrong things. So she invited Dr Malan to return. She told him that she would like to become a Christian, but would have to sort out her life first.

Dr Malan again said the unexpected: "Come just as you are." The words were a revelation to Charlotte. She had assumed that she would have to put her life in order before she could hope to be accepted by God. Instead, she realised that Jesus wanted her just as she was - and he would take care of the sin. Charlotte became a Christian that day.

14 years later, in 1836, Charlotte wrote some verses that summed up how it had been between her and Jesus that day. They ran:

Just as I am, without one plea, But that thy blood was shed for me, And that thou bids't me come to Thee O lamb of God, I come! I come! Just as I am, tho tossed about With many a conflict, many a doubt Fightings within, and fears without, O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Charlotte could not have dreamed that 150 years into the future, her verses would be sung by millions of people all over the world, as they responded to the Gospel presented at many great Billy Graham crusades, and made their way forward to do just as the hymn describes - to come to Jesus Christ, despite sin and fear and doubts, to come 'just as I am.'

On why you should never replace your hymn books

My dear Nephew Darren

I am surprised you are considering buying a new set of hymn books for your church; I had assumed everything you sang would be projected on to one of those screens which are invariably strategically placed to obscure the altar – although wherever you placed it in your converted cinema, it could never spoil its architectural aesthetics.

In my – fortunately limited – experience of such devices, they provide the projectionist with endless opportunities for showing the wrong hymn, or the right hymn but from another edition, which will contain either one verse too many or one too few. Should the hymn run to two pages, then the turnover always takes place some milliseconds after that verse has started, so that the congregation is faced with the snap decision of either trying to sing two lines at double time, or just to join in late, making a nonsense of the words.

When we decided to change hymn books some years ago, the reverberations made the consequences of that little event in Sarajevo seem insignificant. The proposal was to move from "Hymns Ancient and More Ancient" to the more recent version: "Hymns Ancient and Slightly Less Ancient".

Colonel Wainwright said he would be happy so long as we continued fighting good fights and urging Christian soldiers onwards. The men wanted the hymns they remembered from school, the ladies those they sang at their weddings and no one would consider anything that dropped thines or wouldsts. The basses in the choir wanted hymns they knew the tenors found difficult and those who couldn't read music wanted more hymns sung in unison. When a rumour started that the books may contain hymns written in the last 50 years, timetables were consulted for bus services to the next village.

Eventually we reached a perfect compromise: doing something which made no change whatsoever. Miss Simpson was charged with buying yards of sticky backed plastic and repairing the current books. She put a note on the front of every copy that if the page for the hymn they wanted was missing, they should share with the person sitting next to them – an experience which will be almost as traumatic as being invited to pass the peace. Yet another decision has thereby been deferred for a Church Council to make some time next century. Harmony reigns once again.
